

Caldwell Veterans Memorial Hall construction update

Great progress is being made at the Veterans' Memorial Hall. The Caldwell Veterans Council is committed to maintaining the historical nature of the old Carnegie Library as it transitions into the official Caldwell Veterans Memorial Hall.

The Caldwell Veterans Council is required to remove hazardous materials, install an ADA compliant elevator, restore windows, enhance and improve ADA access, painting, electrical, plumbing, lighting, new restrooms, and HVAC repairs and upgrades.

Gas has been installed in the facility which is the last of the underground utilities.

The Caldwell Veterans Council has been working in conjunction with veterans service groups. This is truly a collaborative effort.

Please join us for the "Celebrate Service Project" on October 29-30th. We will be working in conjunction with Home Depot who is supplying volunteers and materials for the project. Volunteers are welcome.

Caldwell population exceeds 50,000

Caldwell received official notice by HUD and the U.S. Census Bureau that it now qualifies as a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) "entitlement community." This designation is given to cities with populations of 50,000 or greater.

Gem State Manufacturing expanding in Caldwell

Gem State Manufacturing/TrailMax Trailers will remain in Caldwell, with an expanded facility in Sky Ranch Business Center. Plans are underway for a new first-phase 50,000 square foot facility to be located immediately west of Southwark Metal Manufacturing on Skyway Drive. The former site of Gem State is now owned and occupied by Airstream Adventures NW. Congratulations to both of these businesses on their location to, and expansion in Caldwell!

New buildings in Sky Ranch and Skyway

Construction on two new spec buildings is underway at Sky Ranch and Skyway Business Center. The buildings are located on Challenger Way. One is occupied by NexGarage. Congratulations to Dianne and her team on their new location in Caldwell!

In addition, construction of three new buildings has begun in Skyway Park along Capitol Street and Freedom Ave. Several lots in the area are also in the negotiation phase. When sold, additional investment and job creation for the area. Stay tuned!

Caldwell Downtown Plaza: Closer to fruition

Destination Caldwell's Indian Creek Plaza committee has been working toward the development of a proposal for a downtown plaza along Indian Creek with approximately 250 days of programmed events per year. Further research is required, however, before this proposal can move forward.

A "Programming, Development & Management Plan" for the plaza must be developed to answer questions about development of the plaza and even the costs of the plaza.

Community plaza expert Dan Senftner will visit Caldwell next week and will take part in research and make recommendations.

Senftner is the CEO and President of Destination Rapid City's Main Street Square and has been hired as consultant for the plaza project. Senftner has been the driving force behind the wildly successful plaza in Rapid City, South Dakota.

KS: I earned my B.A. in Graphic Design from Lewis-Clark State College.

What is something you're passionate about?

KS: My family means everything to me. I love spending time with them, whether we are riding our horses, skiing at Brundage, riding our bikes, or volunteering, I like to make sure that we are together.

Caldwell Industrial Airport News

In November, Quality Electric, Inc. from Boise will begin work on a contract valued at \$343,497.44 to replace runway edge lighting components that have been in the ground for over 25 years and install a new power regulator shelter and new edge lighting and lighted signs for our newest taxiway segments. Federal and state grants will cover 93% of this cost and the City of Caldwell’s share is the remaining 7%.

For most of a week in August the Experimental Aircraft Association’s B-17, “Aluminum Overcast”, and its supporting trucks and trailers dominated the Hubler Terminal apron. Each day passengers were taken on a tour of the local area with power provided by four 9-cylinder radial engines that each produce 1,000 horsepower! A 90-year-old former B-17 crewmember was taken aloft and the aircraft provided a fly-by to the Caldwell Night Rodeo for their “Patriot Night.”



The recent “Soda” wildfire was fought, in part, from the Hubler Terminal apron by a huge Sky Crane heli-tanker under contract to the BLM that operated for several days from our apron with their support trucks, trailer, and 5,000 gallon fuel tanker.

Caldwell’s airport continues to grow with new hangar construction underway on the Ustick end of Aviation Way!


The 2015 Youth Forum was a success!



The Caldwell Police Department Victim Witness Program is sponsoring a **used cell phone collection drive** that will allow everyone to help victims of domestic violence without spending a dime.

Caldwell Police Department Investigations Lieutenant Alan Seevers stated, *"Here is your opportunity to be part of a life changing event for somebody. Domestic violence affects too many. Children that are exposed to domestic violence often grow to be abusers themselves. These donations could provide the funds that allow a victim to leave an abusive relationship."*

Funds received from donated cell phones will be used to provide financial assistance to local victims of crime in emergency situations.

All one has to do is drop unwanted cell phones off at a "drop box" to help victims of domestic violence. Regardless of the condition any and all cell phones are welcome, with or without a battery and/or charger, analog or digital.


